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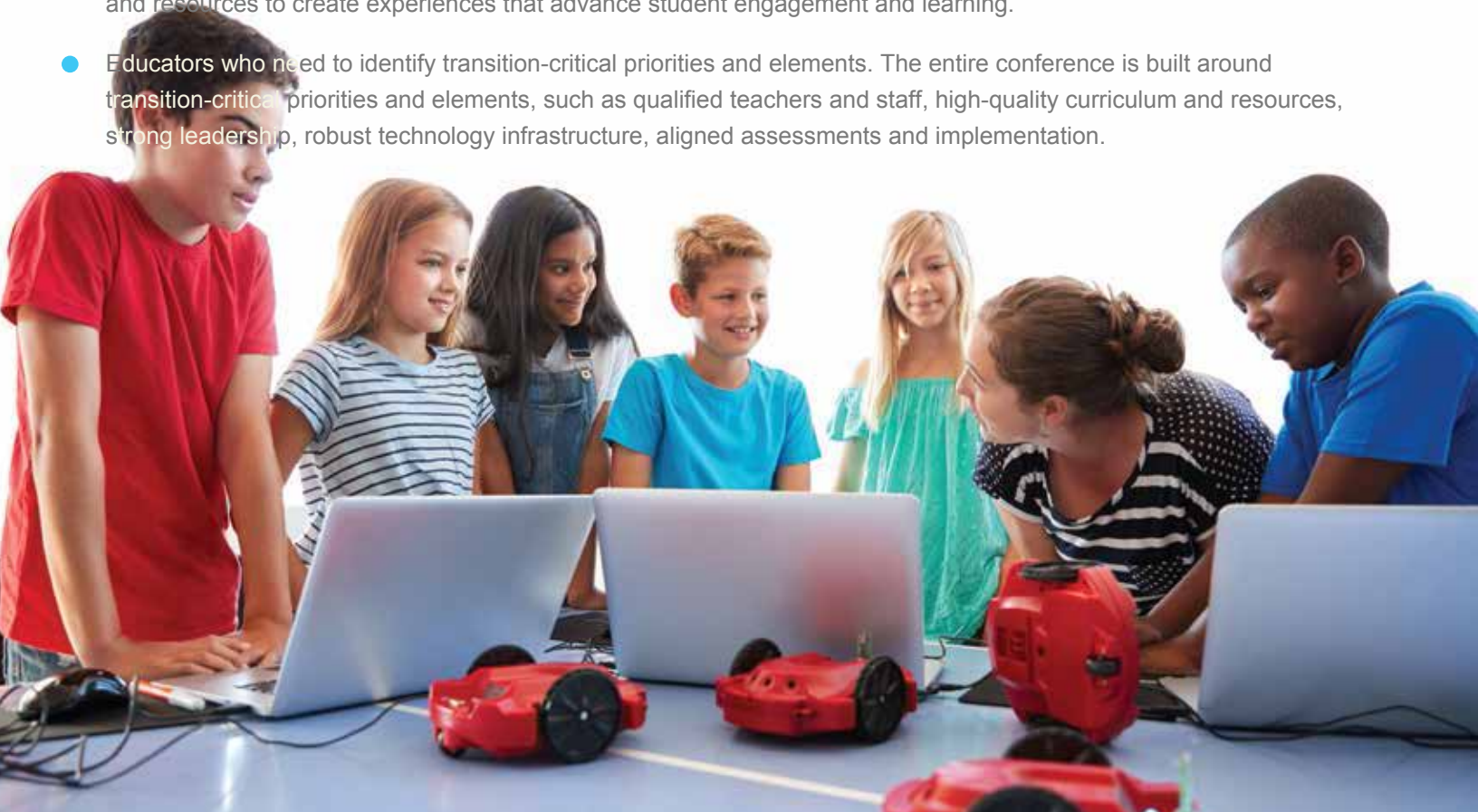
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CONFERENCE AUDIENCE

The conference is aimed at educators from schools, districts, community colleges, adult learning centers and universities including superintendents, ed directors, principals, teachers, technology directors, curriculum and instruction directors, chief financial officers, professional development directors, instructional technology facilitators and technicians.

- Administrators and educational leaders at all levels responsible for practices, policies, and regulations to ensure privacy and security concerns. Gain a firm understanding of privacy and security concerns, how those concerns are addressed within the school or system, and clear communication of policies and procedures with all stakeholders.
- Educational leaders who need to identify the key technical capabilities that provide value to their students, educators, families, and other stakeholders timely and actionable feedback about student learning to improve achievement and instructional practices.
- Educational Leaders responsible for pre-service and in-service professional development for educators and who need to focus explicitly on ensuring that all educators are capable of selecting, evaluating, and using appropriate technologies and resources to create experiences that advance student engagement and learning.
- Educators who need to identify transition-critical priorities and elements. The entire conference is built around transition-critical priorities and elements, such as qualified teachers and staff, high-quality curriculum and resources, strong leadership, robust technology infrastructure, aligned assessments and implementation.



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
